MICHAEL BARAJAS

Michael Barajas is a reporter for the *Texas Observer* who writes about mass incarceration, criminal punishment, police violence and other civil rights issues.

RON BERLER

Ron Berler is the author of "Raising the Curve: A Year Inside One of America's 45,000* Failing Public Schools." He has lectured on public education at a number of colleges, including Baylor and Wellesley. His work has appeared in the New York Times Magazine, Wired, Men's Journal, Outside and on the op-ed pages of the New York Times, Los Angeles Times and Chicago Tribune, among other publications.





CHANDRA BOZELKO

Chandra Bozelko is a syndicated columnist, freelance opinion writer and thought leader. Her weekly column, The Outlaw, now appears in over 150 daily and weekly Gannett/Gatehouse Media papers through its syndication company More Content Now. Since its start in 2018, The Outlaw column has won awards from the National Federation of Press Women, the Connecticut Press Club, Connecticut Society of Professional Journalists (CTSPJ), The Illinois Press Association, The New Hampshire Press Association, and the Newswomen of New York. Chandra was the first inmate to write a regular newspaper column from behind bars, which *The New Haven Independent* named "Prison"

Diaries." It won the People's Voice Webby Award in 2018 and 2019 for Personal Blog/Website, has won two awards from the National Society of Newspaper Columnists (2016 and 2018) and from the Alliance for Women in Media (2019). Her book of poetry entitled "*Up The River: An Anthology*" (BleakHouse, 2013) won American University's Best Book Award in 2015.



ORALANDAR BRAND-WILLIAMS

A veteran Journalist of broadcast and print Media, Oralandar Brand-Williams covers Criminal Justice issues and the Wayne County court beat for The Detroit News. She has covered the Same-Sex Marriage federal court case that became part of the U.S. Supreme Court case that made Same-Sex marriage legal in the United States in 2015. Oralandar, a University of Michigan Journalism graduate, has extensively covered the issue of wrongfulconvictions in Michigan. She has followed the cases of several

Michigan residents who have been exonerated following years of efforts to prove their innocence. Oralandar's former beats have included Race Relations and Religion focusing on metro Detroit's Muslim community. She is a mentor for Report For America and is a former vice-president/Print for the Detroit chapter of the National Association of Black Journalists.

JONATHAN BULLINGTON

MEGAN GUZA

Megan Guza is an award-winning criminal justice and public health reporter for the *Tribune-Review* in Pittsburgh, where she covers a broad range of issues in Southwestern Pennsylvania, with the past six focused on the justice system. During that time, she's covered the mass shooting at the Tree of Life synagogue, the shooting death of an unarmed Black teenager by a white suburban police officer, and protests and cries for racial justice sparked by the murder of George Floyd. Megan earned her bachelor's degree in journalism from Indiana University of Pennsylvania and holds a master's in

communications from Point Park University. She is a three-time Guggenheim Symposium on Crime fellow and previously participated in the Dart Center's Institute of Gun Violence.

writing can be found in both magazines and on the web in/at



reporting has prompted changes in how the state of California tracks late-night jail releases; exposed mishandling of sexual harassment allegations at the University of Rochester; and motivated the US Commission on Civil Rights to call for an investigation into abusive labor practices in immigration detention centers. Her feature on a flawed, three-decade police investigation into a serial rapist in Minneapolis, "When Your Rape Doesn't Count," was a finalist for a 2020 Dart Award for Excellence in Coverage of Trauma.
